

KI TISA/WHEN YOU ELEVATE Shemot/Exodus 30:11-34:3

This week we read of the sin of the golden calf in our Torah reading, while in the Haftara (1 Kings 18) we parallel the message with the confrontation between the prophet Elijah and the prophets of the false god, Ba'al. Because we are currently in the Land and we recently visited the area near to where the confrontation with Ba'al would have occurred, we shall mainly be referring to the sin of worshipping Ba'al.

In the time of Elijah and the wicked king Ahab of the northern ten tribes, the Israelites often worshipped Ba'al. However, that does NOT mean that they had renounced their ties to the Elohim of Israel. Instead, they often alternated between both forms of worship...sometimes following the Torah commandments, and sometimes sinking into paganism. In fact, if this is what you grew up with, you may not have noticed the mixing. It was the prophet Elijah, however, who confronted the people with truth:

1 Kings 18:21 And Elijah came to all the people, and said, "How long will you falter between two opinions? If 7777 is Elohim, follow Him; but if Ba'al, follow him." But the people answered him not a word.

Perhaps they did not answer because it was a quandary for them. Which way should they go? Why should they change the ways of worship that had been passed down to them from their forefathers? Maybe they were quite comfortable in their ways.

So Elijah proposed a test:

I Kings 18:22 Then Elijah said to the people, "I alone am left a prophet of 77/7"; but Ba'al's prophets are four hundred and fifty men. 23 "Therefore let them give us two bulls; and let them choose one bull for themselves, cut it in pieces, and lay it on the wood, but put no fire under it; and I will prepare the other bull, and lay it on the wood, but put no fire under it. 24 "Then you call on the name of your elohim, and I will call on the name of 77/7?"; and Elohim who answers by fire, He is 77/7?" So all the people answered and said, "It is well spoken."

The people and the prophets agreed to the test. Elijah actually encourages them to choose which Elohim they will serve:

1 Kings 18:21 And Elijah came to all the people, and said, "How long will you falter between two opinions? If 7777 is Elohim, follow Him; but if Ba'al, follow him." But the people answered him not a word.

Perhaps they did not answer because they were confused, but Elijah was forcing them to choose "between two opinions." Those strattling the fence had not completely divorced themselves of their Israelite heritage. For such a person who is not ready to make a total commitment, was it good for Elijah to ask them to make a choice between "Third" and Ba'al? Yochanan (John) gives a similar message to the assembly at Laodicea:

Revelation 3:14 "And to the angel of the assembly of the Laodiceans write, 'These things says the Amen, the Faithful and True Witness, the Beginning of the creation of Elohim: 15 "I know your works, that you are neither cold nor hot. I could wish you were cold or hot. 16 "So then, because you are lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will vomit you out of My mouth.

What are the disadvantages in being not totally sold out to הוה? A person who is "lukewarm," or mixed in his worship will find it very difficult to make a sincere commitment to the Father. He wants our whole heart...a heart that desires to follow Him only!

Devarim 5:29 'Oh, that they had such a heart in them that they would fear Me and always keep all My commandments, that it might be well with them and with their children forever!

Yeshua spoke on the importance of the "purity" of the "heart":

Matthew 5:8 Blessed are the <u>pure</u> in <u>heart</u>, For they shall see Elohim.

As we **share life** with the **community** here in **Israel**, we see the following verse **lived out** in their **passionate love** and **service** to **one another**:

1 Peter 1:22 Since you have purified your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit in sincere love of the brethren, love one another fervently with a <u>pure heart</u>,

The choice seems to be ההוה or Ba'al, with nothing in between. Why would the Father desire one who was "cold" over one who was "lukewarm?" Wouldn't a bit of mixed worship of Him be worth more than no worship? When a person serves Ba'al wholeheartedly, although he is completely in error, at least he is serious in his pursuit of a higher power. There is the possibility that he may see that he is totally misguided. However, when a person is "lukewarm," he is not taking either higher power seriously. He is likely to be "double-minded" forever.

James 4:8 Draw near to Yah and He will draw near to you. Cleanse your hands, you sinners; and purify your hearts, you double-minded.

Psalm 119:113 I hate the double-minded, But I love Your Torah.

Let's take another look at what Elijah encouraged the people to do, as he told them to choose between Ba'al and הוה. When a person becomes a sincere believer in Ba'al, it is uncertain whether he will convince anyone else to follow him. But when he mixes the purity of the Word with anything else, this is often socially and politically correct and many are mislead. This is why the Father uses the strong term of "vomit you out." He desires purity and holiness. His desire is for us to return to the "old paths" of complete oneness with Him.

Jeremiah 6:16 Thus says 7777: "Stand in the ways and see, And ask for the <u>old paths</u>, where the good way is, And walk in it; Then you will find rest for your souls. But they said, 'We will not walk in it.'

His desire is for us to **choose Him** and to "obey" **Him** with "sincerity of heart":

Colossians 3:22 Bondservants, obey in all things your masters according to the flesh, not with eyeservice, as men-pleasers, but in <u>sincerity of heart</u>, fearing Yah. ²³ And whatever you do, do it heartily, as to Adonai and not to men,
