

MISHPATIM/ORDINANCES Shemot/Exodus 21:1-24:18

In contrast to the laws of a secular nation which are constantly changing in order to remain relevant, the laws of the Torah are unchanging and eternal. The wisdom of the Almighty found in the Torah is so boundless that it is applicable to all situations in all environments. The New Covenant is not a "new" set of instructions, but a new location of where the Torah would be written:

Jeremiah 31:33 "But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says 7777: I will put My Torah in their minds, and write it on their hearts...

Although many **Torah laws** may **appear totally irrelevant**, in the pursuit of truth, the **Holy Spirit** can **bring to light** some **awesome illustrations**. As an example, let's take a look at the **laws of slavery**:

Shemot 21:2 "If you buy a Hebrew servant, he shall serve six years; and in the seventh he shall go out free and pay nothing...⁵ "But if the servant plainly says, 'I love my master, my wife, and my children; I will not go out free,' "then his master shall bring him to the judges. He shall also bring him to the door, or to the doorpost, and his master shall pierce his ear with an awl; and he shall serve him forever.

Now wait...have not the **Israelites just been freed** from the shackles of **slavery**? Wouldn't it make more sense if the **Torah immediately gave instructions** for **outlawing** any type of **slavery**? What about the **very first commandment?**

Shemot 20:2 " I am 7777 your Elohim, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage.

Yes, the Israelites were saved in a miraculous physical escape from Egyptian slavery, giving us an incredible picture of the ultimate deliverance from spiritual bondage to sin. In Shemot 21 we read of a slave faced with freedom...freedom from his master, and he says, "I love my master." He would prefer to serve his master than have his own freedom...freedom from his master's laws. He would prefer to be a "bondservant" of the Master. He "LOVES" his Master.

It is interesting that the **law of the bondservant immediately follows** the **Ten Commandments** and **precedes** the **rest** of the **600 instructions**. It is a **time for reflection** – **for them and for us**. Are **we willing to serve**? Do we **love our Master**? Will **everything** we do be **for His glory**?

In our service to the Master, we must be willing to give the maximum. Yeshua is our example:

Matthew 20:28 "just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many."

Philippians 2:5 Let this mind be in you which was also in Messiah Yeshua, ⁶ who, being in the form of Yah, did not consider it robbery to be equal with Yah, ⁷ but made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bondservant, and coming in the likeness of men.

Rav Sha'ul followed in the footsteps of the Messiah:

Romans 1:1 Sha'ul, a bondservant of Yeshua the Messiah...

James, the half-brother to Yeshua considered himself a "bondservant":

James 1:1 James, a bondservant of Yah and of Adonai Yeshua the Messiah...

Also **Peter** and **Jude**:

2 Peter 1:1 Simon Peter, a <u>bondservant</u> and apostle of Yeshua the Messiah, To those who have obtained like precious faith with us by the righteousness of our Yah and Savior Yeshua the Messiah:

Jude 1:1 Jude, a <u>bondservant</u> of Yeshua the Messiah, and brother of James, To those who are called, sanctified by Yah the Father, and preserved in Yeshua the Messiah:

Returning to Shemot 21, we should notice that the location where the servant's ear was pierced was the doorpost of the house. The doorposts are both the place to which the blood of the Passover lamb was applied, and upon which Israel is commanded to inscribe the words of the Torah (Devarim 6). The ear is appropriate as the Israelites had already promised to "shema" (hear):

Shemot 20:19 Then they said to Moshe, "You speak with us, and we will hear (shema - צַיַבְּעַלַי)...

To shema/hear is often translated to "obey":

Shemot 24:7 Then he took the Book of the Covenant and read in the hearing of the people. And they said, "All that 77,77 has said we will do, and be obedient (shema - リログ)."

If our **goal** is to be a "bondservant," we should **consider our attitudes**:

2 Timothy 2:24 a servant of Adonai must not quarrel but be gentle to all, able to teach, patient,

The Almighty specifically gave the book of Revelation to "His bondservants" to reveal Yeshua and to give them an understanding of the end times:

Revelation 1:1 The Revelation of Yeshua the Messiah, which Yah gave Him to show <u>His servants</u> - things which must shortly take place...

The instructions of the Torah are everlasting. We haven't even begun to scratch the surface of its meaning and application to our lives. Notice in the following prophetic verses of Isaiah that "'s "house" is established. This is the "house" of the Master that we want to be a "bondservant" of! The "house" where our "ear will be pierced" and we will commit to forever serving the Master!

Isaiah 2:2 Now it shall come to pass in the latter days That the mountain of 77/7' 's house Shall be established on the top of the mountains, And shall be exalted above the hills; And all nations shall flow to it. 3 Many people shall come and say, "Come, and let us go up to the mountain of 77/7', To the house of the Elohim of Ya'acov; He will teach us His ways, And we shall walk in His paths." For out of Zion shall go forth the Torah, And the word of 77/7' from Jerusalem.
